## REMINDER SUMMER PARKING

### **Summer Parking Restrictions . .**

On-street parking is prohibited

### **Ordinance 723.01** **Parking and Storage of junk Vehicle's within the city.**

No person shall park, keep, place, or store openly within the city any junk vehicle, nor allow it on the property

#### **Question:**

What is a junk vehicle?

#### **Answer:**

1. It does not have a current license displayed on it
2. Is not operable
3. Is partially Dismantled
4. Is kept for salvage or scrap

#### **Question:**

Can I keep a junk vehicle?

#### **Answer:**

Yes. Junk Vehicles may be stored INSIDE an accessory structure or a garage.

#### **Question:**

Can I just cover it with a tarp?

#### **Answer:**

No, a junk vehicle cannot be covered with a tarp and stored outside

#### **Penalties**

This ordinance applies to any and all licensable vehicles, such as Automobile's, boats, snowmobiles, motorcycles etc.

If a complaint is filed or during routine inspections you are out of compliance with this ordinance you will be issued a letter from the city, failure to respond or correct to the violation, you will be issued a citation (fine) and could be charged with a misdemeanor Crime punishable by law

**Some interesting History of the Little free Library**

In the beginning—2009—Todd Bol of Hudson, Wisconsin, built a model of a one room schoolhouse. It was a tribute to his mother; she was a teacher who loved to read. He filled it with books and put it on a post in his front yard. His neighbors and friends loved it. He built several more and gave them away. Each one had a sign that said FREE BOOKS. Rick Brooks of UW-Madison saw Bol's do-it-yourself project while they were discussing potential social enterprises. Together, the two saw opportunities to achieve a variety of goals for the common good. Each brought different skills to the effort. Bol was a creative artisan experienced with innovative enterprise models; Brooks was a youth and community development educator with a background in social marketing. They were inspired by many different ideas:

***What is a Little Free Library and what's so special about it?***

A Little Free Library is a "take a book, return a book" free book exchange. They come in many shapes and sizes, but the most common version is a small wooden box of books. Anyone may take a book or bring a book to share.

Little Free Library book exchanges have a unique, personal touch. There is an understanding that real people are sharing their favorite books with their community; Little Libraries have been called "mini-town squares."

**. Can anyone give or take books from any Little Free Library? Do I have to return the exact book I take?**

Yes, anyone may contribute or take books. The more the merrier! If you take a book (or two) from a Library, you do not need to return that exact book. However, in order to keep the Little Library full of good choices for the whole neighborhood, the next time you swing by the Library bring a few books to share. Little Library book exchanges function on the honor system; everyone contributes to ensure there are always quality books inside. This way, we all win!

The ultimately goal is that it will secure the rock more, along with being more pleasing to the eye.

In the meantime, the Washington County Environmental center is open and accepting these recyclables 5 days a week, while there, do not forget to stop into the Free Product Store. This year I continue as the council liaison to the Environmental Advisory Committee (aka: Recycle Committee). Included herein is info on the importance of water. I find it relevant as we live along the beautiful St. Croix River. The following (not in its entirety) was taken in part from an article about the **Water Action Week** declared by the governor April 22, 2016. **Politics aside**, *it's hard to argue about the importance of water and water quality.*

As Minnesotans, who have inherited this incredible state, we have no greater shared responsibility than our stewardship: to protect and improve the priceless natural resources, which we will pass on to our children and grandchildren. That wise stewardship is everyone's challenge and everyone's opportunity.

Tragically, in recent years, the quality of our water has deteriorated in many parts of our state. Too many lakes, rivers, streams, and ditches have become contaminated with potentially dangerous chemicals.

But ignoring our water quality problem is not the solution. Doing nothing will only make matters worse, by allowing problems to turn into crises. That is what happened in Flint, Michigan. We cannot let it happen here.

Which is why I have declared this week to be “Water Action Week” in Minnesota.

I challenge everyone to take actions that will lead to a new era of clean water in Minnesota.

**1. Learn about your water quality.** Test the water in your well. Ask your local officials what they are doing to protect or improve the quality of the water you and your family rely upon.

**2. Teach your children about clean water, and let them teach you.** Talk with your children or grandchildren about the importance of water in our lives.

**3. Set a water conservation goal.** Fixing leaky pipes in your home, turning off the water when brushing your teeth, or using less fertilizer on your lawn are just some of the small changes that will add up to big improvements in our state's water quality.

**4. Call your legislators.** ... Talk with them about...our state's aging water infrastructure.

We can preserve the best of what we have in Minnesota by behaving responsibly. By being wise stewards, we can bequeath clean water to future generations. Water quality initiatives are not intended to take anything away from anyone. I'm not trying to take away anyone's property, or livelihood, or happiness.

But I do want to preserve all of that for everyone else. It is my responsibility as the chief executive of this state, and it's your responsibility as a citizen of this state. It will require all of us working together to achieve our goal.

Failure is not an option.

## **Election Judges Needed for 2016 Primary and General Elections**

Becoming an election judge is a great way to get more involved in your community and show your civic spirit! To serve as an election judge you must be eligible to vote in Minnesota and be able to read, write, and speak English (M.S. 2046.19). Serving is also a great way to get involved in the great State of Minnesota and be a part of making history for your country as well. Presidential elections are particularly exciting for election judges and the community as a whole. We are fortunate to be part of a democracy where we have a voice and a vote and are able to exercise this right as citizens of the United States according to the Fifteenth Amendment of the Constitution.

Election judges serve in many capacities. State law allows you to receive time off work to be an election judge, and you get paid! Your employer can reduce your wages by your judge salary during the hours you are away from work, OR you can voluntarily take a vacation day and receive the judge salary you earn as extra income. Per M.S. 204B.195, an employer can not force you to take a vacation day. If you are working in your own precinct, you may vote on a break or vote absentee before Election Day.

Becoming an election judge is fun, rewarding, and a terrific way to "give back" to your community. The training consists of a two-hour session, and you are paid for attending. Head judges must attend an additional one-hour training as well. Students age 16 and 17 can be election judge trainees if they are U.S. citizens, are in good academic standing, and are granted permission from school/guardian.

### **About Composting**

Composting is the process where organic wastes (grasses, leaves, kitchen scraps and garden debris) are converted into a highly desirable, organic, soil-like material. Gardeners have used compost for centuries to increase organic matter in the soil, improve soil physical properties, and supply some of the essential nutrients for plant growth.

"Bugs" in the form of natural bacteria, worms, fungi, and a variety of invertebrates help turn food and yard waste into compost. The larger bugs process organic wastes physically by tearing or breaking it apart. The smaller bugs process material chemically, by eating it. It is the small bugs that release nutrients in a form that plants can absorb. The bugs work together, feeding in your pile (and on each other), to break down materials. These bugs need a moist environment to thrive. Some of these bugs feed directly on the waste, while others feed on the bacteria in the pile. As they feed on the compost pile, they generate a lot of heat, which also helps the material decompose. The internal temperature is dependent upon the microbial activity, not heat from the sun.

**House Numbers**

**Ordinance 505.045**

It shall be the duty of the owner, lessor and/or occupant of every house, apartment, duplex, industrial, commercial, or other building to have house and/or building numbers clearly displayed thereon, either by affixing to said building or sign post . . . The numbers shall not be less than 3 inches in height, in a contrasting color to the base and be so placed as to be easily and clearly seen from the street when approached from either direction.

**Tips on locating and constructing a rain garden:**

- Locate it near runoff sources but not over a septic system or under a large tree
- Garden should be in a depression 4-8 inches deep.
- Garden should cover approx. 1/8 to 1/4 of the size of the area drained (for medium

**What plants are in a Rain Garden?**

A selection of wetland vegetation, such as wildflowers, rushes, ferns, Shrubs and small trees take up the excess water flowing into the garden. Water then filters through the soil layers before entering the ground water system.

## Buckthorn

A Buckthorn Weed Wrench is available for use at City Hall. A thirty-dollar (\$30.00) damage deposit is required. The deposit will be refunded when the Weed Wrench is returned

## Recreational Fires . .

. A recreational fire is set for cooking, warming, or ceremonial purposes. It may be no more than 3 feet in diameter with flames no higher than 3 feet. The ground within five feet of the fire should be cleared of all combustible material. Please be extra diligent in extinguishing fires. Fires should not just be covered over. This only serves to let them smolder for days. Always use water to extinguish fires. Never leave a fire unattended.

Fires on the beach should be doused with water.
